

Learning Jewish Ways of Mourning Sunday, March 6th 3-5 pm

grief. Our ritual practices express reverence for humankind and respect for the dead, providing concrete ways to work out grief while demonstrating our love for the deceased. For many of us, leaning on these traditions must also be a creative act that fits who we are and the diverse communities (religious and otherwise) to which we, our friends, and our family members belong. Remembering Our Loved Ones





Judaism has a rich tradition surrounding the loss of loved ones. At Havurah we support our community members through these difficult times. Over the past month we as a community have gathered together to honor the memory and celebrate the lives of two extraordinary people:

Sam Fogel and Dina Edelman.

As a special way of honoring their memories, we share the excerpt below from a *D'var Torah* Emily Joselson gave at Havurah's *Shabbat* morning services.

Recently we lost two very special people in our community: Sam Fogel and Dina Edelman. Both lived blessedly long, rich lives. Both remade themselves over years, many times over, and both clearly made names for themselves.

Sam, son of a long line of rabbis, chose his own spiritual path. Born in Lithuania, he moved to Montreal with his family, and thence to California and Vermont. He became a social worker, a husband and father. He was a retiree. A dog lover. A social activist. Sam was an indefatigable writer and scholar. As his family said in his obituary, he was "a seeker and most holy heretic." Like his rabbinic forebears, he thrived by asking questions – particularly, how each of us can act to our fullest capacity spreading compassion for humanity. He lived independently to the ripe age of 96, celebrating life every day. He left his mark profoundly, on so many people.

Dina, with her family, fled Germany and the only life she knew when she was not much more than 12. She learned American ways. She studied math and accounting, and although she never was able to graduate from college, she worked in accounting all her life. She was a devoted wife and mother. An invaluable member of her synagogue, she also worked passionately for Hadassah. She remade herself again when she moved to Vermont, fully integrating herself into her new community. She joined Havurah, lending her voice to our worship services as well as volunteering for committee work and attending community gatherings. She took classes at the college, and even shared her experiences with students. In retirement she helped seniors with their tax filings. When she received her diagnosis, at age 93, she faced her terminal illness with strength, courage and dignity. Although the progress of her illness was swift, she spent her last days surrounded by love.

Certainly, times of such loss prompt us to revisit eternal questions -- what is life, what gives lives meaning, and how do we remember and honor those who have passed? So, as we remember Sam & Dina, let's consider that life presents us with an endless opportunities to remake ourselves, in small & big ways. At each juncture, as we make choices about how to live our lives, where to put our efforts, how to treat others, whether to step up, or step aside, we are making choices about who we are. In this way we are making names for ourselves, by which we'll be remembered.
